Crazy Winter Weather


This winter has been anything but normal. Daffodils, hellebores, and Okame cherries are already flowering in the Greater Knoxville area. Buds on magnolias are getting very fat.

Don't panic! While these plants are flowering, they can handle cold temperatures, provided they don't dip too far below the 20's.

Old hellebore foliage should be removed in winter. Late January is best for USDA Hardiness Zone 7. However, if you haven't gotten it done yet, it's not too late. Once flowering is over and the seed pods develop, this is the time to apply some fertilizer. Manures, Milorganite, Hollytone, or balanced granular fertilizer such as 14-14-14 are fine.

Daffodils come in early, mid- and late-season varieties. It is only the early season ones we are seeing in bloom now. They can handle the cold.

If the forecast is for the teens, harvest the flowers provided they the buds have dropped to near a 90-degree angle from vertical. Horticulturists call the flower buds when still sticking straight up the "pencil stage." When

bent over and still not opened, it's the "gooseneck stage." Daffodils can easily be cut and used indoors when in the goose-neck stage. You'll get the longest post-harvest life from them when cut at this stage (see picture to understand the different stages).

If your daffodils aren't blooming as heavily as previously, you should dig and divide once flowering is over. Also use a little fertilizer when you replant to help the bulbs build. Use a low-nitrogen fertilizer. Bonemeal is commonly recommended for bulbs.

Regardless of plant, this is also the best time of year to get a soil test done before applying fertilizer. Check

Tranquility Garden Work Days
